**A Founder of the Museum and
School of Art in Cleveland.**

CLEVELAND, June 27.—Mrs. Liberty Emery Holden, widow of the late founder and editor of The Cleveland Plain Dealer, died Saturday at Pasadena, Cal., relatives and friends were notified today.

Mrs. Holden, who was 94 years old, had been in ill health for more than a year. Her husband died here in 1913 and shortly afterward she gave up her home and moved to California.

Mrs. Holden is remembered here for her activities in educational and welfare work. She was one of the founders of the Museum of Art, the Cleveland School of Art and Lakeside Hospital, and also was prominent in Cleveland society.

Five children survive.

**Active in Congregational Club Here
and Brooklyn Church Leader.**

Mrs. Euphemia Lawson Warner, prominent in Brooklyn club and church circles, died on Sunday at her Summer home in Brightwaters, L. I., at the age of 69. She was vice president of the Big Sisters Movement of the Brooklyn Federation of Churches and of the Congregational Club of New York and Vicinity and a member of the board of managers of the Brooklyn Orphan Asylum and the Congregational Home for the Aged in Brooklyn.

She is survived by her husband, Edwin G. Warner; three sons, Harold L., Douglas K. and Albert L. Warner, the latter a member of the staff of the Washington Bureau of The New York Herald Tribune, and two daughters, Mrs. Edith W. Patton and Mrs. Marion W. Carlile.
